Another day in the Delhi heat



A day after the Delhi witnessed dusty winds and drizzle under the influence of a western disturbance, the maximum temperature in the city dropped to 38.7 degrees Celsius from Thursday's 39.4°C, the Met department said. It also forecast partly cloudy conditions for the next 24 hours.

WOMAN RAPED IN PUNJAB BAGH, 3 MEN ARRESTED

NEW DELHI: A 36-year-old woman was allegedly gang-raped by three men in west Delhi's Puniabi Bagh area on Thursday morning, police said, adding that the accused have been arrested.

The victim told the police that she was looking for "some help", when the one of the suspects offered to help her, but said she would have to accompany him to a house with two of his friends, officers said.

Police identified the suspects as Naveen Singh (28), Bishwa Mohan Acharya (26) and Akshay Taneja (30), all of whom work as waiters in nearby restaurants. They allegedly took the victim to a rented accommodation and offered her a drink laced with sedatives.

"The victim said she fell unconscious. When she woke up, she realised she had been raped by them. The woman made a PCR call and a case was registered," said the officer.

SDMC at pains to find operators for 16 crematoria in rural areas

NEW DELHI: Despite several attempts to find NGOs to manage and run its funeral centres, the South Delhi Municipal Corporation (SDMC) has found few takers to run cremation grounds located in remote rural areas.

A letter written by SDMC commissioner Gyanesh Bharti to the standing committee dated February 3, 2022, states the corporation invited 'expression of interest' from NGOs and selfhelp groups to manage 22 of its cremation grounds and burial grounds twice over the last six months but the civic body received applications for adopting only seven cremation grounds for development and day-to-day maintenance.

"Out of the seven applications, six were found to be meeting the criterion set by the municipal corporation," said a senior public health official.

In a meeting held on March 31, the standing committee of the SDMC granted approval for adoption of only six cremation units, including two facilities at Harkesh Nagar and Sarai Kale Khan CNG; an electric crematoria under the central zone; two crematoria in Chhawla and Dwarka Sector-24 under Najafgarh zone; and another one in

Bindapore under the west zone. A second public health official, who was part of the selection committee, said most of the

unallocated funeral centres are located near rural belts. "NGOs do not prefer to take up these units as they are located in remote areas and receive very few bodies on an average. Moreover, we have also received several complaints of interference in operations from local villag-ers, who prefer to bring their

arrangements," said the official. Over the last three years, the municipal corporations have been trying to outsource the operation of funeral centres to reduce the manpower deployed at the units.

Of the 42 funeral centres under the SDMC, 20 are already

run by self-help groups. "We have seen improvement in operations and maintenance of crematoria managed by NGOs as earlier, people complained about the quality of wood and there were allegations of extra charges...," said an official.

Leader of the house Inderjeet Sehrawat said alternative arrangements in the form of making local gram samiti or local charitable organisations will have to be made to address the issue of non-adoption of village crematoria. "We will work out arrangements with residents of these villages," he added.

Suman Gupta, general secretary of the NGO Badi Panchaya, which operates Nigambodh Ghat, said, "The number of platforms has gone up from 70 to 120 since we took over in 2011.

Your summertime indulgence

A unique sherbet stall in Chandi Chowk

Why can't he share his recipe with us? Aqeel Ahmad turns his head towards the blurry *bazaar* crowd, smiles like an enigmatic visionary and says nothing. A

very special institution, he is the vendor of the most exclusive drink in the Walled City. To be sure, there is no dearth of drinks in the area's summertime lanes. But all these nooks and corners are mostly

lined with shacks selling red sherbet. Particularly noteworthy is the melon-based 'Mohabbat ki Sherbet' that has gone viral in the area (already featured here!).

But there can never be enough of Aqeel Ahmad's offering. His jaggery-based 'gur sherbet' is one of its only kind in the historic quarter.

Determined to preserve his monopoly, he will not share the recipe under any circumstance, "because I'm the only one making this sherbet," he asserts, standing behind his modest establish-

ment at the entrance of Pahari Imli. It consists of a table on which lies a giant plat-

ter filled with the light golden brown drink, which is protected from dust and flies by a plastic cover.

The makeshift stall has been a landmark for more than 70 years, though in winters the vendor temporarily substitutes it with a booth for diapers, woollen pyjamas and "steamers" that he introduced with the arrival of the coronavirus.

The sherbet stand's origins date back to 1947, when "my waalid saheb (father) Zaheer Ahmed had to give up his jewellery store in Chandni Chowk due to communal issues." His father started selling the 'gur sherbet' right on this spot, close to their home.

Suddenly, two young boys arrive. Ahmad squeezes a lemon into a glass and pours the juice with a long ladle. One of the boys gulps down the drink in one go, while the other downs it slowly, savouring each sip.

The stall serves from 8 in the morning to 10 at night. The time has shifted for the ongoing fasting month of Ramadan — from 2pm till midnight.

PS: Sometimes, you will see the vendor's son Nabeer at the stall. Equally tight-lipped about the recipe, he tells the potential copycats to "ask papa" if need be.
